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What is IGF?

- IGF is a series of meetings that originated as a result of the discussions at WSIS in Tunis
 - First meeting in Athens 2006
 - Second meeting in Rio de Janeiro 2007
 - Third meeting in Dehli 2008
 - Fourth meeting in Kairo 2009
- Each meeting with some theme(s)
- No decision making body, just discussions
 - Part of the overall UN agenda
 - Tons of practical issues...

What is WSIS?

- WSIS
 - World Summit on the Information Society
 - The purpose of the World Summit on the Information Society, as stated in Resolution (A/RES/56/183), is to develop a “common vision and understanding of the information society and the adoption of a declaration and plan of action for implementation by Governments, international institutions and all sectors of civil society”.
 - While there are many issues associated with the dawning of the information society, the themes proposed for the Summit can be clustered into three main concerns: vision, access and applications.
 - Hopefully(!) many more IGF meetings before next WSIS

IGF Structure

- IGF Chair Nitin Desai (UNSG)
 - Small secretariat in Geneva (Markus Kummer)
- IGF Advisory Group (AG) appointed by UNSG
 - 47 Representatives of business, government, civil society & technical (Internet) community
 - + Guests from international organizations
 - + Special advisors to the Chairman
- IGF AG's role
 - Assist in drafting the agenda, shape the focus, propose speakers, address logistics etc
 - Composition & structure likely to change after Rio

First IGF - Athens

- Focus areas
 - Openness, diversity, security, access
 - “Emerging Issues” in Internet governance
- 35+ workshops (not part of IGF)
 - ISOC/GIPI “Building local access” workshop
 - ISOC/Internet community “participation” workshop
- Who was there?
 - Wide-ranging subset of WSIS Tunis
 - Gov’ts, Business, civil society, Internet community, ISOC Ambassadors, ISOC members...

IGF Athens: success or “outstanding” success?

- Truly multi-stakeholder and a meeting of equals
 - A completely different animal
 - Balanced discussion on range of issues
- Dialogue, experience sharing & collaboration
 - Workshops, dynamic coalitions....
- Internet Community’s role was critical
 - Shaped event with contributions & AG participation
 - Helped drive the discussion
 - Internet community speakers brought balance to key areas
 - Reinforced cooperative, collaborative nature of the management & administration of the Internet

IGF Athens: success or “outstanding” success?

- Real focus on capacity and community building
 - Less of a focus on the more “political” issues
- Still some concerns about the lack of “results”, over structure, etc.
 - AND the real impact that the IGF is having at the local level
 - “Localising” the debate is seen as critical

Second IGF Rio - what is different?

- Athens worked surprisingly well, but key concerns from Athens....
 - Costs/difficulties for developing country participation
 - Do developing countries feel their concerns & needs were addressed?
- Post Athens consultations
 - Continued emphasis on capacity building & training
 - Emphasised the need (for some) to discuss “Critical Internet resources”
 - Resulted in a 5th main focus session for Rio
 - Seen all stakeholders assert themselves more in process..

“Enhanced Cooperation” - Challenges

- Enhanced co-operation (Tunis agenda)
 - “Governments, on an equal footing, ... carry out their roles and responsibilities in international public policy issues pertaining to the Internet”
 - N. Desai, IGF Chair, consulted informally on what ‘enhanced cooperation’ is & what can be done to increase cooperation among Governments & relevant stakeholders
 - Despite the desires of many to see the IGF and “enhanced co-operation” as separate and distinct, they continue to blur and pose challenges

Road to Rio – Challenges

- IGF Rio 12–15 Nov 2007
 - The road to Rio has been just as arduous as Athens
 - Logistical and organisational aspects challenging
 - Main sessions just finalised, speakers invited last week
 - Logistics of sessions still unclear
 - What is the “role” of the session chair (from Brazil)
 - How do we ensure “value” to participants?
 - AND the “political” pressures will be greater
 - New topic: Critical Internet resources
 - Important to ensure a broad and meaningful interpretation

ISOC and IGF Rio

- Preparatory work since Athens
 - Contributions from ISOC to the IGF consultations
 - Participation in regional IG workshops, roundtables
- Rio engagement
 - ISOC members and Chapters
 - ISOC Ambassadors program
 - Workshops
 - ISOC and other partners have proposed workshops covering IPv4-v6, the root server system, IXPs...
- Capacity building & access remain at forefront
- Focus on sharing experiences & best practices

Examples of 'Best Practices'

- IXPs
 - Neutral services points operated in common interest
- DNS registries
 - Neutral non-profit organisations, serving an open market of competitive registrars
- IP address registries
 - Neutral, independent industry self-regulatory bodies
- ISPs
 - Infrastructure & access services highly competitive, lightly regulated, subsidise to maximise accessibility
- Rootservers
 - Widely distributed around network density & topology

Third IGF in India - What Next?

- Recall fundamental principles of Internet model
 - Vint Cerf description of “eco-system”
 - Every part contributes to the whole and is important
 - IP addresses are nothing without electricity..
- Dialogue, dialogue, dialogue..
 - Local multi-stakeholder approach vital
- Getting users on-line is critical
 - Development & capacity building needs stability and growth
- Showcase ‘best practices’
 - Capacity building, domestic Internet infrastructure...

IGF in India - Food for Thought...

- Stimulate dialogue
 - Focus on real outcomes for developing capacity
- Encourage experience sharing
 - APNIC/SANOG meeting is an excellent example of intersect of policy, operations, education and capacity building
- Support the Internet model
 - Multi-stakeholder model has been successful for 15 years in providing stability, flexibility and innovation
 - Open processes
 - Collaborative and inter-dependant environment
